AFSC Notes From David Easter

Responding to the Syrian Refugee Crisis

While AFSC fully supports resettlement options, it recognizes that resettling an increased number of Syrian refugees in Europe and the United States does not address the root cause of the problem, the Syrian civil war. Ending that war must become a top priority. It won't be easy, but AFSC calls on the U.S. and the international community to further peace efforts and address the refugee crisis by considering: Agreeing to an arms embargo, including halting the flow of weapons from countries neighboring Syria, and halting training and technical assistance to all armed groups involved in the conflict.

Increasing humanitarian assistance, particularly to neighboring host countries, to address the needs of those impacted by the conflict and to support resilience within host communities.

Sponsoring multilateral negotiations to achieve a ceasefire and end the conflict, including as many parties to the conflict as possible, and seeking support from international and regional powers. Acknowledging the U.S. role in the wars on Iraq, including the violent overthrow of the government and use of crippling economic sanctions as major contributors to the current crisis in the region. Increasing refugees the U.S. resettles in Fiscal Year 2016 to 200,000, with half of them Syrians.

Albany Friends Meeting for Business Feb. 14, 2016

Present: Maggy Wiard, Co-Clerk; Joe Levinger, Dot Richards, Elizabeth Gordon, Judith Fetterley, David Oehl, Pat Beetle, Carol Barclay, Anne Liske, Pierre Douyon, David Easter; Maud Easter, Assistant Clerk.

- 1. The meeting opened with a period of silence.
- 2. The Memorial Fund Committee reported that the fund currently has assets of \$243,940, with \$4,838 received last year and \$21,500 expended for the roof. Funds with Friends Fiduciary have been moved from their general fund to their green fund, as was done with funds in Pax World. For the record, the Meeting authorized an update of the minute for the Memorial Fund Committee to open an account with Friends Fiduciary Corporation should it be necessary. It was agreed to authorize Maggy Wiard as Co-Clerk to be an additional signer for Friends Fiduciary withdrawals.

3. The Outreach Committee, in collaboration with Ministry and Nurture, is taking a look at the text read on the third Sunday to nourish our worship. The committee also suggested that it would be valuable to have a discussion about vocal ministry, to strengthen both inreach and outreach. Ministry and Nurture Committee will consider when and how to do this.

The Outreach Committee also asked for consideration of whether reducing the number of chairs in the meeting room would increase the welcoming feeling of the space. It was agreed as an experiment for one month to remove the stacked wooden chairs and 4 others and to arrange a few chairs to create a slight oval, maintaining space for wheelchairs and access. It was also suggested that the Outreach Committee consider how our programing might contribute to outreach, mentioning valuable faith community food programs and programs addressing racism.

The Meeting approved Outreach Committee's plan to invite Helen Garay Toppins to come and speak to us on June 19th on potluck Sunday.

4. Trustees reported that Julia Richards needs to step aside as our Treasurer and Stacie Faraone is willing to serve as an interim treasurer. The Meeting gratefully approved Stacie's appointment. The 2015 year-end report was distributed, showing spending last year of \$76, 618.80, which included special roof expenses, our contribution to New York Yearly Meeting, our contributions to community organizations, and our regular expenses. The current unrestricted checking account balance is \$1,611.79. Trustees has just sent out a fund letter asking for contributions.

Trustees presented a budget for first reading today, which will be considered for approval in March. The basic budget is the same as last year with 2 changes: less money is needed for childcare workers and a contribution to New Sanctuary for Immigrants has been substituted for Church Women United (which is no longer meeting). It was agreed to reduce the number of printed newsletters. Ministry and Nurture was encouraged to publicize the availability of scholarships for Quaker events.

- 5. Elizabeth Gordon expressed her desire to transfer her membership to Albany Friends Meeting which was welcomed by all. She will write Binghamton Meeting to request the transfer.
- 6. The meeting closed with a period of silence.
