Last year, Worship Sharing was available before each Meeting for Worship. Business Meeting approved experimenting with a new suggestion from Ministry and Nurture, that Worship Sharing happen when someone suggests a topic and a time. For example, we were invited during the Jan. 29 announcements to meet after Social Hour, which was a meaningful happening for a dozen people.

Although a 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday is ideal because we have no regular evens after social hour, a person could invite others to meet at any time on a topic of their choosing. Reminders of the Worship Sharing process can be found on the book case in the library. Basically, everyone is invited to speak from the silence, on the topic, once. This is not a discussion; others are asked not to respond to someone else's comment.

This committee of Albany Friends Meeting vets concerns that we feel the Meeting should do something about. We also support as a committee concerns that need not await Business Meeting.

We met Wed., Feb. 22. Paul will, on behalf of the Committee, bring to Business Meeting his letter about Friends Central School in Wynnewood, PA, which placed on administrative leave two teachers who supervised a club that invited a Palestinian speaker to the campus.

Work continues with other Quaker groups on promoting products from cattle raised on pasture that sequesters carbon, rather than on industrialized operations. Others are welcome to join Sheree in this. She will also gather information on Community Solar for the Meeting (see news item).

People, mainly Pat, updated us on local events. March 7 is the NYCLU (New York Civil Liberties Union) Action for Driver License Campaign. New Sanctuary for Immigrants is promoting Movimiento Cosecha, the May 1 national strike of immigrants, calling for dignity, respect, and permanent protection of all immigrants in the United States. There was a suggestion at a Bethlehem Neighbors for Peace meeting to write to labor leaders about galvanizing job programs in needed areas, similar to the effort to put a human on the Moon. Criminal justice campaigns include Raise the Age and HALT (to stop solitary confinement) and Capital Area Against Mass Incarceration (CAAMI) attending Parole Board meetings (see news item). Albany SURJ (Standing up for Racial Justice) will do a teach-in on policing at City Hall.

Liz spoke of a Rensselaer County League of Women Voters postcard party. Many postcards were written and readied to mail to federal and state legislators on many topics, especially our democracy. Envelopes need to be processed in a special facility. Postcards are far speedier in their delivery.

Sue was pleased to report that Anita Stanley plans to work on children's Peace Week for 2018 after she finishes up the American Friends Service Committee local poster events (see news item).

The Clerk gathered everyone into worship.

**Memorial Fund Annual Report**: Judith Fetterley provided an Annual Report from the Memorial Fund, which is comprised of donations to the meeting managed as a special projects fund. The Memorial Fund is currently invested with the Community Loan Fund, Friends Meeting House Fund and both Pax World Fund and Friends Fiduciary green, carbon free funds. The current assets total is \$257,879. The committee was requested to re-verify there are not any investments in nuclear energy. The report was accepted and approved and thanks given to the generosity of the original donors.

**Outreach:** The committee has been discussing the idea of a Little Quaker Library in the front of the meetinghouse which would contain Quaker and other materials as discerned by the committee and other in the meeting interested in the project. Outreach will continue to steer the project and consult the Library Committee.

Treasurer's Report: Unrestricted cash on hand as of February 8, 2017 is \$11, 058.16.

The donation of \$2,000 in memory of Bettina Wolff was placed in the General Fund.

**Ministry and Nurture:** The committee proposes that Worship Sharing happen when an interested person suggests a topic and a time such as meaningfully happened for about a dozen people on January 29 when Barbara Spring, during announcements, invited people to join her at 12:00 to Worship Share on a topic that was concerning her. A fifth Sunday, which this happened to be, is ideal because we have no regularly scheduled event after social hour. Otherwise a person could invite others to meet at any time of their choosing. Reminders of the Worship Share process can be found on the book case in the library. The idea was affirmed and approved.

**Discernment about becoming a Sanctuary Congregation:** Interest and concern about Sanctuary has been a strong message in recent worship and after worship conversation. The growing question is how are we led on this issue as a Meeting at this time? David Easter shared some information about the

earlier Sanctuary movement during the wave of Central American conflicts when Friends and Unitarians collaborated in short term housing and transporting individuals, often en-route to Canada. There was some additional discussion, but with a concern for the weather, we agreed that we would have a called meeting for discernment and organizing after potluck on February 19, 2017. An announcement will go out to the listserv.

The Meeting for Business closed with a message from the Co-Clerk to travel home safely in the snow.

Have we searched our hearts for the sources of prejudice that lie in each of us?
