

On Sun., Sept. 11, the Easton Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) will celebrate Easton Day, its annual commemoration of the 1777 Feathers of Peace incident when a party of Burgoyne's Indians set aside hostilities and joined Easton Friends in worship. This year's celebration features a talk by Eileen Flanagan, author of *Renewable: One Woman's Search for Simplicity, Faithfulness, and Hope.* She sees the Feathers of Peace story as incorporating divine guidance, coming together across differences, and the power of nonviolence: three elements of Flanagan's work for climate justice. She will share what she is learning about how people can tap into their rich history and create new stories for their own time.

All are welcome to the Easton Day events. Registration is at 10 a.m., followed at 10:30 a.m.by the Feathers of Peace story and Meeting for Worship (with a concurrent program for children up to 12 years old). Potluck at noon is followed by singing led by Charlie Lapinski and Eileen Flanagan's presentation at 1:30 p.m. Easton Day is at the Easton Friends' South Meeting House, 227 Meeting House Rd. We've been in the building for a year and have rediscovered the joys and minor headaches of taking care of the Meetinghouse. These include getting to interact with all the interesting groups using the building, watching rabbits and squirrels frolic in the back yard and, on the down side, three bat encounters during the recent summer heat!

One gentle reminder we would like to make to members, attenders and meeting committees is to remember we ask of each other the same care and use of the building that we do of outside groups. Here are a few requests:

Everyone is really doing a good job with the refrigerator. Please remember to label with "use by" date and purpose for what you leave from one week to the next. Often unlabeled items aren't used. Precut veggies and fruits, unless well packaged, tend to dry out and are best offered to someone to take home.

After hospitality on First Day, and when meeting committees or other events happen, please try to communicate with one another about who will take responsibility for final kitchen clean-up, in particular putting all food away and wiping down the butcher block table.

When furniture is rearranged for a gathering, we ask that it be returned to the original arrangement. John and I are not always back in the building before outside groups arrive, so please be mindful of this.

We also have a need to fill – would someone be willing to replace either or both of the simple battery-operated wall clocks, one in the First Day School Room and the other in Room 2? Both have failed. Ideally these can be very plain, but best to avoid the Dollar General models as they tend not to last.

And a fixer/upper request: Would anyone be willing to prep and repaint the small white bench on the front porch? This can be a take home project! Thanks.
