

AFSC Notes

Every year the U.S. imprisons nearly half a million immigrants in over 250 detention centers — with devastating effects to their lives, families and communities. AFSC advocates for human rights for them and works to change the terrible policies and treatment involved in detention and deportation.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) detention facilities look a lot like prisons. Barbed wire fences line the perimeter of many facilities. Inside some centers, detainees are held in what they call *las hieleras* — Spanish for "the iceboxes" — rooms so cold they feel like walk-in freezers.

Detention tears apart families and results in lost wages for households struggling to get by. Many are locked up merely for being suspected of committing an immigration violation and are waiting to see a judge. Immigrants can be locked up for months, even years, without a single charge filed against them.

There's growing momentum to stop immigrant detention. AFSC directly supports immigrant and refugee communities in the U.S. and advocates to limit the use of detention. From David Easter

World Hijab Day, Mon., Feb. 1





Driving to her campus, she was harassed by people rolling down their car windows and giving her the finger, shouting at her, and one truck tried to run her off the road. So I decided something has to be done about this intolerance. What if we all wore a hijab for a day in solidarity? I shared my thoughts with Sonia, my roommate from Afghanistan, and she told me of a friend of hers who wears a hijab daily, and is scared for her safety. A movement among non-Muslim women to express solidarity with the Muslim counterparts by wearing hijabs is misguided, write Asra Q. Nomani and Hala Arafa in the Washington Post [Dec. 21]. The hijab is not a religious requirement, they say, and has been used by fundamentalists to subjugate women. "To us, the "hijab" is a symbol of an interpretation of Islam we reject that believes that women are a sexual distraction to men, who are weak, and thus must not be tempted by the sight of our hair," they write. "We don't buy it. This ideology promotes a social attitude that absolves men of sexually harassing women and puts the onus on the victim to protect herself by covering up."






Albany Friends Meeting for Business, Dec. 13, 2015

Present: Maggy Wiard and Cinda Putman, Co-clerks; Sheree Cammer, David Easter, Barbara Spring, David Oehl, Sue Clark, Pat Beetle, Carol Barclay, Dot Richards, Anne Liske, Paul Rehm, Katja Rehm, Joe Levinger, Pierre Douyon, Pamela Gao; Maud Easter, Assistant Clerk.

- 1. The meeting opened with a period of silence.
- 2. The Clerk read a letter requesting membership from Patricia McCormack, which was welcomed and referred to Ministry and Nurture.
- 3. The Treasurer's report indicates unrestricted cash on hand of \$3,205.94 and was approved. Our pledge to Yearly Meeting has been made, but in addition to our regular monthly expenses, we still need to send our contribution to Regional Meeting and contributions of \$4,200 to the groups we help support.
- 4. Peace and Earthcare suggested a presentation after Rise of Meeting luncheon on January 17th by Becky Raymond about her experiences in Malawi, which was enthusiastically approved.
- 5. A concern was raised that the Meeting is a co-sponsor of the New Sanctuary for Immigrants project, but that we do not have a budgeted contribution for this organization. Peace and Earthcare can recommend that a contribution be added to the 2016 budget. It was also agreed that it would also be good to collect money for a contribution at our Christmas Eve service.
- 6. Pierre Douyon reported on an effort of Quakers and other faith groups on the other side of river to raise funds to support bringing a refugee family here. Anne Liske volunteered to attend a meeting of this group to bring back information about how our Meeting might become involved in refugee support, which could include consideration of someone living in the Meetinghouse.
- 7. A concern was raised about a possible improvement to the heating system. Trustees has considered the idea and, if consultations with a plumber find it to be feasible, has agreed it should proceed. Pierre and John Cutro will follow up on the idea.
- 8. The Clerk raised the request from Northeastern Regional Meeting for someone to represent our region and serve on the Yearly Meeting Nominating Committee. Anyone willing to volunteer should contact Co-clerks Maggy Wiard or Cinda Putman.
- 9. Northeastern Regional Meeting has written asking for our input on the charter and by-laws they are in the process of developing. The clerk shared copies for members to review before the January Meeting for Business. 10. The meeting closed with a period of silence.
