The Clerk gathered everyone into Worship.

Treasurer's Report: Unrestricted cash on hand as of November 5, \$5,430.02. The total New York Yearly Meeting quota for the year has been paid in full. The report was approved.

Ministry and Nurture: The committee has asked Barbara Spring to provide a presentation for those in the meeting interested in learning more about palliative care and related decision-making. Friends are encouraged to save the date April 29, 2018 on their calendars for this discussion.

Since David Oehl's recent move unfolded quickly, members of the Ministry and Nurture Committee asked the Meeting to consider writing a note of appreciation to him for his service on the Outreach and Ministry and Nurture Committees and his leadership with Young Adult Friends. The Clerk composed a quick message based on suggestions and Friends approved.

Peace Week: A detailed letter (attached) was read on behalf of the planning committee for holding children's Peace Week August 13-17, 2018. Additional volunteers will be welcome as planning moves forward. The Committee is available to answer questions and requests approval from the meeting to proceed. The Committee will return with a specific request for funding; several possibilities are being considered including a prior designated donation, to be determined amount from the Memorial Fund as well as other Quaker and community sources. Friends expressed appreciation for the planning committee's work and heartily approved the return of Peace Week.

Two requests from the Labor-Religion Coalition:

A last minute request for the Meeting to sign on to the Humane Alternatives to Long-term (HALT) Solitary Confinement Act before the NYS Legislature was briefly summarized. The Peace and Earthcare Committee has reviewed and supports signing on to this legislation. Friends approved.

A second recent request concerns an invitation to consider signing on to a petition letter to the Rensselaer County Sheriff expressing concern regarding his plan to sign on to participate in the 287(g) ICE program. The Clerk read the petition letter. Friends who reside in Rensselaer expressed their intent to sign the petition as individuals and encouraged others to do so as well. Friends approved the Meeting signing on to the letter.

Sanctuary: The request was made about whether we are ready to convene an ad-hoc committee to further explore what the Meeting's role in Sanctuary might be. Friends shared some questions and ideas. The meeting agreed that this would be a good idea. Several Friends expressed an interest and willingness to consider serving. Anne Liske will post an invitation to the listserv and report back at the next Meeting for Business.

Nominating Committee: John Amidon has agreed to serve as the third member of Nominating Committee.

Christmas Eve: First Day School Committee has agreed to take responsibility for the Christmas Eve Worship.

Racial Concerns Committee is planning to share the Albany Friends Meeting' Letter of Apology to Afro-Descendants approved in 2013 (copies available on request) with the congregation of the Macedonia Baptist Church. Friends approved.

The Meeting closed with silent worship at 12:40 p.m.

Dear Friends:

In past years a hallmark project of Albany Friends Meeting (AFM) has been the planning and implementation of a Peace Camp for children, for one week each summer. A small committee is now being formed with the goal of re-starting this event, renamed Peace Week, hopefully in the summer of 2018. We have consulted with the caretakers of the Friends Meetinghouse to find a week that is free of other Meetinghouse commitments, and are asking permission from the members of AFM to hold Peace Week 2018 during the week of August 13-17. We are requesting use of all the rooms on the first and second floor, as well as the front porch, back porch, and backyard. If permission is granted, we will treat these spaces with care, and leave them in good condition.

The goals of Peace Week will be in keeping with the Quaker Peace Testimony, i.e., a commitment to nonviolence and reconciliation in all spheres of life. We will be mindful of other objectives as well:

- Addressing issues of race and poverty
- Providing opportunities for cooperative, expressive activities, without competition
- Learning techniques for conflict resolution and peer mediation
- Getting along with others who may be “different”; multiculturalism
- Participating in integrity and compassion activities, with a focus on empathy and listening
- Involving refugee and immigrant families
- Care for the environment
- Discovering a sense of “oneness”; spirituality

We are aiming at the grade 2-8 age group, probably split into three sections. We would like to hire high school and young adult interns, as well as adult teachers, to head up each of the three groups. Hours would be roughly 8:30-12:30 on most days, although there is the possibility of a full day when needed for an extended activity. We are currently in the midst of a search for a qualified director. We will be building teams of volunteers as well, to help with functions such as clean-up, food preparation, monitoring, medical care, etc. As in the past, we are hopeful that we can draw on members and attenders of AFM to help fill these roles. We are also looking for funding sources, to be enhanced by a low, affordable fee for the campers.

Thank you for considering our request for the use of the Meetinghouse for the week of August 13-17, 2018. We are happy to answer any questions you may have, and look forward to a close and fruitful working relationship.
